

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

FF: WHAT IS THE LOCAL METAL SCENE IN HANOI LIKE? IS HEAVY MUSIC SOMETHING THAT IS GREATLY RECEIVED THERE?

The scene is small but definitely growing. We try to help by doing some promoter work as well, with the aim to bring more international bands to Vietnam while also helping local bands showcase their talent and hopefully build a tight knit community along the way. There is a lot of talent out of Vietnam to be discovered!

FF: WHAT IS YOUR ULTIMATE GOAL FOR THE BAND? WHAT DRIVES YOU TO CONTINUE BEING IN THIS BAND?

We hope to continue writing and playing music together for as long as we can

FF: WE HEARD THAT YOU ARE SET TO RELEASE A NEW ALBUM SOON? COULD YOU GIVE US AN INSIGHT ABOUT WHAT YOUR LISTENERS CAN EXPECT FROM IT?

We've spent a whole year writing and will soon go into recording for the new album. The sound is quite a bit darker compared to our previous full-length MAI, and we're incredibly excited for this release. Stay tuned!





FF: HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE THE MUSIC THAT OUTLINE IN COLOR MAKE? WHAT/WHO ARE YOUR MAIN INFLUENCES AS A GROUP?

This is a tough one We all have very different influences. I (Skaggs) listen to a lot of hip-hop and r&B, but I came up on heavy metal and hardcore. CJ (guitar) loves Poppy, and a surprising amount of top 40 and country music, and Jon (Vo-cals/Bass) listens to a lot of pop, but also is an avid Core listener. If you were to ask about any band in the scene, he would be the most likely to have the answer. I couldn't even begin to tell you Austin's (Drums) musical taste. He's got his own set of favorities. I know he's a big fan of Run The Jewels though :)

FF: YOUR UPCOMING EP 'IMPOSTER SYNDROME' WILL BE OUT ON JULY 10. COULD YOU TELL US MORE ABOUT IT? WHAT IS THE THEME BEHIND IT, AND WHAT CAN FANS EXPECT FROM IT?

The theme is Imposter Syndrome, which simply explains the phenomena when you are very proficient at something, but for some reason hold strong feelings of self-doubt. Quite literally feeling like an Imposter or a fraud. Music wise you can expect a wide array of sounds ranging from Pop rock and alt rock, to the heaviest tracks OIC has ever produced, and everything in between.

FF: HOW DOES THE SONGWRITING PROCESS WORK WITHIN YOUR BAND **ESPECIALLY WITH WRITING 'IMPOSTER'?** 

To be honest, it has varied a bit with every album/ep process. This project specifically, we worked with Andrew Baylis. We flew him to Oklahoma,/and he lived with us for a month while we produced the EP's. Having a producer work with us at home made the process remarkably simpler than projects passed.

FF: WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THE ALTERNATIVE MUSIC SCENE TODAY COMPARED TO WHEN YOU FIRST STARTED AS A GROUP?

It's really cool to see how everything has grown and how genre's and sub-genre's have diversified. When we started AttackAttack was just getting started and a lot of heavy hitters today hadn't formed yet. It is wild to see who has come up, who has stayed on top, and the new blood that constantly is changing the game. I never thought 10 years ago that the scene would progress to the near mainstream level

#### FF: WHAT FUELS YOU TO CONTINUE MAKING MUSIC?



Funnily enough, it was pop music that got us started. Our earlier acoustic periormances (yes, we were an acoustic band) involved us wanting to mashup popular songs in four chords. Maroon 5, Taylor Swift, One Direction, FloRida, and many more. Nobody was safe. We really thought we were staying in that route until our collective music taste changed and evolved.

FF: MOST OF YOUR SONG TITLES ARE NAMES OF GIRLS, HOW DID YOU COME UP WITH THIS IDEA? ARE THESE GIRLS REAL PEOPLE YOU'RE PERSONALLY CONNECTED TO?

#### FF: WHAT IS THE LOCAL SCENE LIKE IN SORSOGON?

It felt pretty awkward to be honest for a band like us

Sorsogon, Irosin specifically, hosts a slew of bands ranging from Fiesta hitmakers that could take every single request written on a piece of tissue to the heaviest metalheads that seemed to be able to rip your guts out when performing. We were in that pretty awkward in between. We couldn't take requests since we liked playing our own original songs, and we weren't really heavy, heavy. So in the beginning, it felt as if we didn't belong anywhere there. We've managed to find footing in Albay and lately up north in Manila so it's exciting to have that under our belt. At the moment, we still feel like we're trying to find our footing in our own hometown but luckily for us we found many homes in many scenes from many places.

#### FF: HOW HAS YOUR MUSIC EVOLVED EVER SINCE YOU FIRST BEGAN PLAYING MUSIC TOGETHER?

Continuing our story about playing pop songs as an acoustic band, we started out being that during our highschool days and the evolution began with that. As we grew older, so did our collective music taste. We gravitated towards alternative rock in general. Our sound shifted to resemble the bands and artists we like listening to. Drive Like I do, Blink-182, Taking Back Sunday, Silverstein, Brand New except for you Jesse, fuck you, and local acts like Typecast, and many more helped mold our sound and what songs we play today. We don't expect to stay and settle for a singular sound any time soon be-cause we're still growing, and so will our music.

Being an unsigned independent band = challenge. We only have ourselves to depend on as far as production goes with our music. We're lucky enough to have many friends and kids of all ages that support our craft and are generally excited with each release. With their support and us just wanting to make music because we want to, that struggle turns into motivation to be as good as we can be

#### FF: WHAT'S BEEN KEEPING YOU BUSY DURING THIS QUARANTINE? WHAT'S IN STORE FOR SAVE THE YOUTH AFTER THIS PANDEMIC?

### FF: HOW WAS WITHIN DESTRUCTION FORMED? WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO BE MUSICIANS AND WORK TOGETHER AS A GROUP?

LUKA: Within Destruction was formed by Rok and me, we were very good friends in high school and were already in a cover band together. We started listening to a lot of similar bands like As I Lay Dying, The Black Dahlia Murder, Suicide Silence, etc. which inspired us heavily. I think the primary reason why we wanted to do a band with our own music is the fact that we were watching a lot of tour documentaries from those bands and we were just so excited about experiencing the same.

#### FF: HAVING BEEN AROUND IN THE INDUSTRY FOR A FEW YEARS NOW, DO YOU THINK YOU HAVE FOUND YOUR REAL "SOUND" OR ARE YOU STILL ACTIVELY DISCOVERING IT?

LUKA: There was a lot of controversy and long, deep talks on the internet about our genre and so on... I believe people will be even more confused with the upcoming Yōkai album and I love that! To put it simply, we've always had our own sound - we've been playing heavy music ever since and the new album is also heavy. But we do like to spice things up with inspiration from different genres, we've always done this from black metal parts, djent and so on. But this album definitely went overboard in a few songs where inspiration became the base of it so we're super excited to see how people accept it!

FF: COULD YOU GIVE US A BACKGROUND ABOUT HOW SAILING BEFORE THE WIND STARTED AS A GROUP? WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO CREATE MUSIC TOGETHER?

We were formed in 2011 as a no-live band. It means we don't play live, just releasing songs. But a year later, we reached a point where we felt like we should do shows, so we started doing that as a band September 2012. Since then, we went through several lineup changes and now I (Bitoku, bassist), I am the only original member left. I do most of the writing/recording/mixing/mastering but with the help of others. I really thank the presence of my current band members, they're the reason why we keep this band alive. Besides metalcore, I also love Hard rock bands like Harem Scarem, Def Leppard, Bon Jovi, and more super underground bands from the 80-90's. I was just a listener before I started the band and I find there isn't a band that combines catchy chorus/guitar melody + metal riffs/Breakdowns. I mean, yes there are catchy metalcore acts but I feel their melody is not influenced by traditional hard rock bands but more like modern pop and R&B, so I decided to create the sound I want to hear on my own. Just writing songs that I want to listen to.

FF: TELL US ABOUT YOUR NEWLY RELEASED SINGLE 'INTRO'.

Fun fact: we already played "Intro" in a live show back in 2015. At first, we had no plans on recording it but it seemed like people wanted it, so we finally made a recording version. It's just for fun and for the fans.

FF: WHAT IS YOUR ULTIMATE GOAL AS A BAND?

No ultimate goal. I don't want to reach the "goal". Endless self-learning and self-evolution is the way to go.

FF: WHAT IS THE LOCAL MUSIC COMMUNITY LIKE IN TOKYO? IS METAL A WELL-RECEIVED GENRE THERE?

The local metalcore scene is spreading steadily since I started this band. It's not very big but not that small. We have a some kind of metalcore show almost every weekend in local venues, before COVID-19 happened. For Japanese Metalcore lovers, I can recommend some bands, to name a few: Sable Hills, Falling Asleep and From the Abyss. They are all good live bands.

FF: WITH THE RISE OF HEAVY/ALTERNATIVE BANDS IN JAPAN, WHAT DO YOU THINK MAKES SBTW DIFFERENT/STAND OUT FROM THE REST?

We aren't using breakdowns for breakdowns. Our melodic guitar parts stand out because of breakdowns. I always try to construct tracks that contrast between non-melodic and melodic sections. Nostalgic melody is our core element, that's why I stick to melody.

FF: WHAT CAN YOUR LISTENERS EXPECT FROM THE BAND IN THE NEAR FUTURE?

One thing I can say is we have some raw new materials. More nostalgic melodies, more breakdowns.

FF: COULD YOU GIVE US A BACKGROUND ABOUT WHEN AND HOW DEAD CROWN STARTED AS A GROUP?

KENDALL: Bryton (Drums) started playing drums in my old band and that's what started our relationship. Him and Eric (Gultar) started writing some demos that I thought were pretty sick. When my old band started to fizzle out I approached them and suggested we do the damn thang. Shortly after we recruited Brent (Bass) and the rest is history.

FF: HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE THE KIND OF MUSIC YOU GUYS MAKE? WHAT ARE THE INSPIRATIONS BEHIND YOUR SONGWRITING?

We make heavy ass metal with alot of breakdowns that you can beat ass to with some splashes of hip hop / rap Influence. I'd say we have a very wide variety of inspirations. So it's hard to pin point. But I know we just take influence from all the things around us and things that we like. When writing if there is something we want to do, we do it and will reference stuff similar. But between all of us there is a very wide array of influence and I think that shows in our music and gives us our own kind of "Sound".

FF: WITH THE RISE OF UPCOMING METAL BANDS IN TODAY'S MUSIC SCENE, WHAT DO YOU THINK SEPARATES DEAD CROWN FROM THE REST?

One thing we have been told alot by people is that people who dont like metal, like us and like our music. We try to make the music heavy as fuck, but still make it assessable to average listeners or people who may not even listen to music. Which I think makes our music funner. You can party listening to us, you can fuck to us and on the filp you can get pissed off, beat ass and even sometimes depressed while jammin us. We are just 4 real dudes writing music we want to write. I think at the end of the day everyone can walk away with at least something from our band. We are easily relatable because we are just doing us.

FF: SO FAR, WHAT ARE THE BIGGEST CHALLENGES YOU HAVE FACED AS A BAND AND HOW DID YOU OVERCOME THEM?

Out on the road, as a smaller band, tour can be VERY rough. There are some nights that are absolute trash and its hard to keep morale and heads up. Especially when we are running off no sleep and a shit fast food diet. We are tight knit and best friends so thankfully we all have eachother to lean on. If we didnt have that there are probably some situations weve been in that would have broken us.

FF: WHAT'S THE BEST AND WORST THINGS ABOUT THE HEAVY/ALTERNATIVE SCENE TODAY?

I think its cool where technology has come and how accessible it is to make music these days and express yourself. But thats also the flip side. Things are oversaturated at times and it makes it harder and you have to work 10x harder to get noticed.

FF: WHAT DRIVES YOU TO CONTINUE BEING IN THIS BAND?

Call it a reach, but fuck it, we wanna make metal cool again. It would be sick to see our style of metal reach the heights of legends back in the day like Limp bizkit, Silpknot and Linkin Park. Plus we have fun, we are best friends and we like to party with each other.

FF: LASTLY, WHAT'S NEXT FOR DEAD CROWN? WHAT CAN YOUR LISTENERS EXPECT FROM YOU IN THE NEAR FUTURE?

Well, corona kind of fucked up our touring plans, but we have been at work on our first full length album. So hopefully we will have a new single for people scon!

FF: TELL US ABOUT HOW SHADED COME ABOUT AS A GROUP. WHEN AND HOW DID YOU BEGIN?

So we started when Cal and I were at University together in 2016. We lived in the same house and pretty much spent that first 12 months really trying to find our sound and what we wanted the band to truly be. We met Dan around a year later and, soon after, started playing live shows and touring.

FF: YOUR DEBUT 'A FAMILIAR LOVE' IS A LOT DIFFERENT MUSICALLY FROM YOUR LATEST RECORD 'TEMPORARY FIX' WHICH GIVES MORE OF AN INDIE POP VIBE. HOW DID YOU FORM YOUR SOUND NOW COMPARED TO YOUR FIRST RELEASE?

When we released AFL, we were a lot 'younger' mentally I think. We had all basically fallen into the rock scene and didn't really know much else when it came to writing and performing. It got to a point where we sort of had to accept the fact that we didn't love the music we were making anymore and decided to step out of our comfort zone. It's funny too, once we stepped out of that comfort zone, we actually felt WAY more comfortable being able to write and create the music we wanted to create.

FF: YOU'VE SAID THAT YOUR LATEST SINGLE 'K.I.A.' IS THE BIGGEST AND MOST CHALLENGING STEP OF YOUR CAREER. CAN YOU TELL US MORE ABOUT IT?

Yeah for sure; so 'K.A.A.' is the start of a really big project for usi can't really reveal details just yet - and it's the first step in really trying to cement ourselves as a 'pop band'. It's the perfect representation of SHADED right now and we couldn't be more excited to share more with everyone. HOW DOES YOUR SONGWRITING PROCESS USUALLY GO? DO YOU HAVE ANY SPECIFIC RITUALS OR SPECIFIC ARTISTS YOU LISTEN TO FOR INSPIRATION?

I think the best route to go down when it comes to songwriting is just following your gut and keeping it authentic. We don't tend to draw direct inspiration from other songs, but i'd say that artists we're into do, subconsciously, influence our sound. Our process is usually either and instrumental followed by lyrics, or lyrics stripped back with a guitar or piano that we then flesh out into a full production. We know each other's writing styles from front-to-back too so when we're in a session, everything gels super well.

FF: ULTIMATELY, WHAT IS YOUR GOAL AS A GROUP? WHERE DO YOU WANT TO BE IN A FEW YEARS?

We just want to feel like our music has helped and/or touched people. We want people to be able to relate to our music because, just like everyone else, artists and writers do what they do as a means of expression. Every lyric that I write is drawn from an experience and it's my way of venting or getting things off my chest. In terms of where we'd like to be in a few years - I think touring the world. Playing for different people in different cities, surrounded by different cultures. It's a big goal of ours to travel the world.

FF: WHAT'S NEXT FOR SHADED? ANYTHING YOUR FANS COULD LOOK FORWARD TO IN THE NEAR FUTURE?

MORE SONGS. We're so excited to share everything with you guys. And hopefully next year we'll be out on the road again to see you all!







FF: WHEN AND HOW DID TALATA START? WHAT INSPIRED YOU GUYS TO MAKE MUSIC TOGETHER?

September 2007 when we started to jam and make original music. When I came back to the Philippines from performing abroad with a cover band (showband), Jomal & I decided to form a group that would allow me to compose original songs. So we asked his cousin James Roy and our friend Dacky to join us. Then we met Anton in 2008 before we had our first gig in Mayric's in February of that year.

Like most people, we now work from home. We also make some time to write new songs and practice on our own. From time to time we make "quarantine jam" videos to entertain our beloved supporters.


FF: HOW HAS YOUR MUSIC EVOLVED SINCE YOU FIRST BEGAN PLAYING MUSIC TOGETHER?

I think as most places the people who are impacted the most are the people who run venues/bars and all the production people whose lives and salaries depend on events and shows happening. From a band perspective, I come from the world of heavy music and as mentioned above, most heavy bands don't play very often anyway, so in that regards the virus has not really been anything more different than what we're used to. Heavy bands only play like maybe 3 or 4 times a year.

A government that bends over backwards to appease their CCP masters. It's been hell here watching protestors get best up and killed by the police. So the virus win tahin compared to all that...

FF: LASTLY, WHAT'S YOUR ADVICE TO YOUNG, ASPIRING BANDS?

Dude...ALL bands need to understand that there are BILLIONS and BILLIONS of bands on this planet - anytime you release music you MUST keep that in mind. How is your song, your art, going to break through the billions of releases every day so people will actually check you out? I can't begin to tell you how many bands have submitted stuff that has been lackluster not just musically, but even visually - press photos, music videos, lyric videos, etc. They either already sound and look like a million other bands OR is just not up to par. Bands really need to think about all of this stuff. It's not just your music has to be good, but you have to really think about the whole package. Even if you'me a super underground DIY-as-fuck punk band, you still have to think about how your music and the visuals that go with it cut through all the shit that's out there. Unless of course you create music for yourself only - but then why would you be promoting it through Unite Asia? bahabate... it through Unite Asia? hahahaha...

FF: WHEN AND HOW DID YOU START UNITE ASIA? WHAT IS THE VISION BEHIND IT?

The website started 5 years ago and was really just a reaction to me being tired of checking out music-related websites that I love going to stuff like Metalsucks, Metal Injection, Punknews, Blabbermouth, etc) and never seeing much about Asian bands. I've been involved with bands from out here for 20 plus years with my own touring with a band I used to play in called King Ly Chee and all through my travels I've come across PHENOMENAL bands from right here. So I wanted to know what THOSE bands were up to but all I could find was info on bands from the US or Europe. So I was literally just like "Fuck it, let me start my own website". And here we are 5 years later... I had NO idea that it would resonate so well with others in Asia and around the world for that matter. others in Asia and around the world for that matter.

FF: HOW DO YOU MANAGE YOUR TIME BEING IN A BAND, HAVING A DAY JOB, AND RUNNING UNITE ASIA?

It's actually not that hard...my dayjob is the only thing that I have to make sure I don't mess with so there's money to put food on the table for my wife and daughter and so that she gets to continue to go to a great school. Everything else is incredibly manageable because I just do it all at night after she's asleep. Playing in a heavy band in Hong Kong means I have PLENTY of free timewer rarely play shows here, practice maybe once a week, so playing in a band (Dagger) doesn't really take up much time at all.

My daughter gets to see me do all this so that's really special to me. She sees me wake up every morning and update the site or work on the site before she goes to bed. So she gets to see me take time to help other people get their art out there - hopefully that'll inspire her to be involved in similar ways to help others. involved in simi!ar ways to help others.

FF: HOW CAN YOU COMPARE THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE ALTERNATIVE MUSIC SCENE IN THE ASIAN CONTINENT TODAY TO WHEN YOU FIRST STARTED DOING PRESS AT UNITE ASIA BACK THEN?

That's a good question...I think from a personal standpoint I'm still so jealous about what bands in scenes like the I'm still so jealous about what bands in scenes like the Philippines, Malaysia, Singapore, indonesia. Thailand, Nepal have compared to what we have (I'm speaking specifically about heavy music). I mean look at this great interview I'm doing right now in this Killer zine! The last time I got interviewed in Hong Kong was maybe 10 years ago? So the only thing I've experienced these past 5 years is further affirmation that scenes all around Asia are doing profound stuff to help their own communities from bands to record labels to record stores to venues to from bands to record labels to record stores to venues to recording/practice studios to photographers videographers to zines/magazines - it's SO cool to see this beautifully passionate ecosystem that places have all over Asia. All of these people are the unsung heroes keeping Asian music thriving, and continues to be why I keep wanting to run Unite Asia even through all the social/political turmoil and tragedy here in Hong Kong this past year.

FF: WITH THE CANCELLATION OF LIVE EVENTS FOR MONTHS BECAUSE OF THE VIRUS SITUATION, HOW IS IT AFFECTING THE MUSIC COMMUNITY?

#### FF:WHAT'S NEXT FOR PURVEYR IN THE NEAR FUTURE? WHAT CAN YOUR FOLLOWERS EXPECT FROM YOU?

We will continue to grow our dimensions to be able to reach more of the creative community. Digitally we have expanded to podcasting, and worked harder on putting out better video content, so expect more of those in the future. In addition, we are looking to provide better stories and more information on how to thrive and live a creative life.

#### FF: LASTLY, WHAT'S YOUR ADVICE TO YOUNG, ASPIRING CREATIVES?

Two things. First, they should understand that they will never know everything, so learning and studying is something we should do consistently. Second, they should execute. Thinking and conceptualizing is easy, anyone can have an idea within a few minutes, but most won't see their ideas come to life because they don't know how to execute them. If you are passionate about an idea, work on it. Whatever happens in the journey, successful or not, you will learn a lot in the process of execution that will be helpful in your future — the growth of your current project or even the next projects or ideas you will have.

#### FF: WHEN AND HOW DID PURVEYR BEGIN? WHAT IS THE VISION AND MISSION BEHIND IT?

PURVEYR was established in 2012 with the purpose of showcasing Filipino street and creative culture. I started it in September 2012 with three contributors — Oleg De Leon, David Villania, and Chip Esguerra.

What started as a blog promoting culture, is now a full-fledged, multi-dimensional media brand that aims to be a 'Creative Life' resource through our different dimensions — digital, print, retail and events. At the core of it, we envision a world where every person finds value in creativity.

### FF: SO FAR, WHAT DO YOU THINK HAS BEEN YOUR GREATEST ACCOMPLISHMENT AS A BRAND DIRECTOR?

I think it's just being able to conceptualize, create, and execute a brand like PURVEYR. Thinking of and conceptualizing brand ideas are not that difficult, but to be able to work on it enough to see and hear a brand ingrained in people's stories, experiences, imaginations, and ideas is a feeling that's out of this world for a brand-builder.

As little as a comment like, "I'm inspired to do this because of PURVEYR." is already a great accomplishment for me. To create something of enough relevance for people to actually embed it in their lives is surreal.



FF: HOW DOES AN ARTIST GET THEIR ART/PRODUCTS NOTICED? HOW CAN THEY ACHIEVE SUCCESS TODAY IN THE DIGITAL AGE?

There are a lot of tips out there, and maybe some even better than what I can recommend. But for me, the best one is to stay consistent and persistent. Be consistent in what you want to do. People have short spans of attention nowadays, so repetition of one vision or message is a strong way to make them remember. And because (most types of) success do not come easy or quick, you have to keep at it even if as of the moment the future looks bleak, here persistence is key.

# CRYSTAL LAKE ASIAN METALCORE

Upon almost more than 15 years of being a band, Japan metallers CRYSTAL LAKE are finally getting the global reception that they truly deserve, and being one of the acts that are putting Asian heavy music on the map for international fans, especially in a scene that usually forgets Asia. The release of their third studio album 'True North' was a record that started to allow them to be more noticed globally, got them signed to SharpTone Records, and paved the way for them to tour all over the world. Today, with their latest effort 'Helix', Crystal Lake is arguably one of the biggest heavy acts not only in Asia but around the world introducing the power of Asian metal.

In this interview with them, we asked the trailblazers all about their success in the modern metal scene, plus insights on their highly received record 'Helix'!

FF: HOW IS THE DYNAMIC BETWEEN THE MEMBERS OF THE BAND? WHAT HAS KEPT CRYSTAL LAKE AROUND AND MAKING MUSIC ALL THESE YEARS?

We've done thousands of tours the past few years. Luckily we got a good reaction to not only our music but our live shows from our fans all over the world. They always want our new stuff and I'm so happy with it. That keeps us alive and gives us a strength to move on. We don't want to be bands that only their old songs are wanted such as Metallica and Kiss.

FF: CRYSTAL LAKE IS ONE OF THE FIRST BANDS WHO PAVED THE WAY FOR ASIAN BANDS TO BE MORE NOTICED IN THE INTERNATIONAL MODERN METAL SCENE. WHAT, IN YOUR OPINION, DID IT TAKE FOR A JAPANESE ACT TO BREAK THROUGH A SCENE THAT IS MAINLY DOMINATED BY AMERICAN/EUROPEAN GROUPS?

The key is "Originality" the way Westerners can never do like unique melodies or unique composition etc.. We clearly realized it when Apollo became our most viewed video on YouTube. Some young Japanese bands shows their originality and I guarantee that their quality is insanely good like Paledusk, Sable Hills and Graupel.

FF: YOU HAVE BEEN ON TOUR WITH MANY BANDS IN DIFFERENT COUNTRIES IN THE LAST TWO YEARS. WHICH TOURS WERE YOUR FAVORITES AND WHO WOULD YOU LIKE TO TOUR WITH NEXT?

The first US tour with August Burns Red, Fit For A King and Miss May I and the Never Say Die Tour in Europe we headlined. I never imagined how people were excited about us. I got goosebumps when I hit the stage on the first day of the tour. They were chanting our name! That was unbelievable. It would be awesome if we can tour with my childhood heroes like Machine Head and Slipknot.

FF: HOW DO YOU GUYS FEEL ABOUT THE INTERNATIONAL RECEPTION YOU HAVE GOTTEN SINCE YOU STARTED TO PERFORM MORE AROUND THE GLOBE?

It's crazy that a band from a small asian island headlined one of the greatest tours in Europe and is going to be on tour with Parkway Drive. I want to know what we will get when we reach as far as we can as Asians.

FF: WHAT KEY DIFFERENCES DO YOU NOTICE BETWEEN PERFORMING LOCALLY IN JAPAN AND PERFORMING SOMEWHERE FAR, LIKE, FOR EXAMPLE, IN THE UK? think every city has its uniqueness. Even in Japan they are totally different. Some can go nuts and others can't but have entitusiasm for our music and show us respect. But I'm sure Japanese crowds are the craziest in the world. They do a lot of stage dives and mosh as well. FF: HOW HAS WORKING WITH ONE OF THE BIGGEST LABELS IN THE METAL INDUSTRY (SHARPTONE RECORDS) IMPACTED THE They are working so hard to push us to the next level. When we met Shawn the president of Sharptone Records, he told us like "Do whatever you want to! I believe you guys." We're lining up different touring plans in Australia and overseas, but it's all dependent on how the pandemic plays out! We obviously have heaps of time to write at the moment, so that's what we're doing. We're not sure what we're working towards, but we're just trying to write as much as possible and see where it takes us! You can expect new music from us by the end of the year.:)





# WHAT'S AN ALBUM THAT HAS INFLUENCED YOU GREATLY?



One album meaningful to me is a somewhat controversial release from one of my favorite bands, Sick Of It All. It's a live record called Live In A World Full Of Hate. Listening to it over and over, showed me how hardoo takes influences from rap music which is something that's a big part of my life. That live record was said to have been recorded in Jersey but was said to have been recorded in Europe. I read an article about it in 97 or 98 that it was a combination of two shows. Back then I didn't know for sure. One thing I was certain of was that I loved it.

Because of that record it was ingrained in my mind to not remove myself from being influenced by different music and at the same time, since it was a 24-track record, it helped prepare my mind to eventually want to play that many songs in one set, it also spoke to me in terms of how to write songs that matter to me because the words on every track on there hit me like lessons you should learn from a father or older sibling. When I met Lou Koller, I told him about how that record made an impact on me, he looked at me as if he was saying, "what the fuck man?" and started to laugh and eventually went on to say, "you like that shit?" and we went on to talk about something else.

My first time to hear a live hardcore record back in the 90s. The energy and rawness are captured perfectly on this album. I love all the songs played here.

By the time I saw Sick Of It All live, it was like the Live In A World Full Of Hate is playing in my face. My all time favorite album.

I felt that I may have understood how to produce music for bands, films, advertising or just for yourself. But that record opened my eyes on how to develop your really own sound. It somehow gave me the tools to discover a whole new way of making music and afterwards my tracks became way better with a lot more. vision, emotions and clearness
