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FF: FOR PEOPLE WHO DON'T KNOW ABOUT YOU YET, WHAT CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT MAGNOLIA PARK AND THE MUSIC YOU MAKE?

> We are a six piece pop punk band from Orlando, Florida. We blend genres like emo, emo rap, alternative rock and hip hop together to create a modern yet nostalgic sound.

FF: YOU KICKED OFF 2021 WITH THE RELEASE OF YOUR DEBUT MIXTAPE 'DREAM EATER'. HOW HAS THE FEEDBACK BEEN? WAS IT SOMETHING YOU ANTICIPATED?

Honestly the feedback was way better than we anticipated! The project as a whole was well received. After releasing our first single of 2021,"Back On My Bullshit", we wanted to keep the hype going and we were ecstatic to see that Dream Eater succeeded.

FF: WHAT ARE THE MAIN INSPIRATIONS LYRICALLY AND MUSICALLY WITH 'DREAM EATER'? WHAT IS THE MESSAGE YOU WANT TO PERCEIVE THROUGH THIS RECORD?

> Artists like Machine Gun Kelly, The 1975, Blink 182, Nothing Nowhere and Point North continue to inspire us musically. Our lives and shared experiences are what inspire us lyrically. We want to portray raw feelings of battling anxiety, feeling lost in the world and emotional heartache but also give a sense of hope and longevity. Life really sucks sometimes but we want to help people get through their day. We want our music to make a difference.

FF: YOU COLLABORATED WITH RENOWNED MUSICIANS LIKE GLIMMERS, KELLIN QUINN, OLIVER BAXXTER AND MORE. COULD YOU TALK ABOUT HOW IT ALL CAME ABOUT?

Most of the Dream Eater features came from relationships our band has developed with these artists. We connected with Broadside through our singer, Josh, working with one of their members. Our relationship with Glimmers came from connecting online after both of our videos started gaining traction on Tiktok. Our feature with Kellin Quinn came through FeaturedX which is a platform where you can contact other artists for features. He loved our song "Love Me" and agreed to hop on the track. He continues to promote our music and videos, we are very thankful for his

FF: HOW HAS SEAWAY BEEN COPING WITH THIS PANDEMIC, ESPECIALLY SINCE YOU'VE RELEASED YOUR FOURTH FULL-LENGTH DURING THIS TIME? WHAT HAVE BEEN THE CHALLENGES OF RELEASING MUSIC IN THIS PERIOD?

-It's so weird to think that we started recording at the beginning of the pandemic, then released the record in the pandemic, and we're still in the pandemic haha. I think at the start we had writing and recording to divert our attention but since Big Vibe came out it's been tough to plan for what's next. Toronto has been one of if not the most locked down city in North America so we're just trying to get out on the other side.

FF: IN YOUR LATEST ALBUM 'BIG VIBE', IT'S NOTABLY HEARD THAT YOU'VE BEEN MORE OPEN TO EXPLORE DIFFERENT BLENDS WITH YOUR SOUND. WOULD YOU SAY THAT YOU'VE FINALLY FOUND SEAWAY'S "REAL SOUND" WITH THIS ALBUM OR ARE YOU STILL OPEN TO EXPLORE IT?

I- think that Big Vibe is definitely what we were trying to achieve when seeking Seaway's "real sound" but that will probably change on the next record. That's what's so fun about this band, as we grow and evolve, so does our music.

FF: WHAT IS THE MAIN THEME OF 'BIG VIBE'? WHAT ARE THE INSPIRATION'S BEHIND THE ALBUM LYRICALLY?

-Really tough to pick a main theme. There's a lot of themes and ideas throughout the record, even within songs.


-Put the windows down, turn the volume up and lose your mind for a while.

FF: TELL US ABOUT THE NEW SINGLE 'MINDLESS' WHAT IS THE STORY BEHIND IT? HOW DID THE SONG COME TOGETHER?

Mindless was based around a conversation I had regarding racism and social privilege. People tend to be quite tunnel visioned in their opinions when they haven't experienced the same type of disadvantages as others and I found this narrow mindset seemed to be popping up all over the place. With all the resources we have, ignorance is no longer an excuse when it comes to empowering those less fortunate than us so I guess this song is my little vent of frustration on the matter. The song as a whole came together quite easily and getting Mikaila on board was the cherry on top!

FF: WHAT'S ONE THING YOU WISH YOU'D KNOWN WHEN YOU FIRST STARTED YOUR JOURNEY AS A BAND? IS THERE ANYTHING YOU COULD'VE DONE DIFFERENTLY?

I think we'd go back and tell ourselves to just enjoy everything as it comes and not to stress as much. There was definitely a point in time where the band was a point of stress for all of us and it was becoming difficult to enjoy. Something snapped after a while and we all took a step back, chilled out and all of a sudden we were having fun as a band again. Funnily enough, as soon as we relaxed and took our time, everything started falling into place so I'd say it's important to keep perspective and just do things the way you want to do them. If YOU enjoy what you're doing, everyone else

FF: WHERE DO YOU FIND INSPIRATION FOR YOUR SONGWRITING ESPECIALLY ON YOUR LATEST EP 'LIE THROUGH YOUR TEETH'? HOW WAS THE PROCESS OF RECORDING IT?

Inspiration tends to come from something small and we build our ideas around that. It could be a lyric, a riff, a rhythm, we just grab something and run with it. The EP itself stemmed from the concept of lying and all the different consequences that come from it. Whether you're being lied to, lying to someone else or lying to yourself there's always consequences and relationships that tend to suffer so this was our deep dive on that. The recording process itself was a blast! We spent time with Jack Newlyn (Paradise Club) and fleshed out the whole EP, we actually wrapped recording the week before Australia went into Covid lockdown so we've been holding onto it for a while.

FF: WHAT DO YOU THINK ABOUT THE ALTERNATIVE SCENE TODAY? WHAT ARE THE BEST AND WORST THINGS ABOUT IT?

The alt scene is alive and kicking now more than ever. The thing I really love about the scene is the sense of community and with the internet as readily available as it is, you can connect with more people now than ever before. I think this has really been pushed to the front during all the lockdowns with online release shows, subscription content, livestreams on Twitch/Discord etc. we're definitely pushing into a new era. Perhaps one of the downsides is representation, especially in rock music, but then again I think that's on the up as well. The scene should be an inclusive community for everyone and that starts by putting role models that people can look up to at centre stage. I hope the change I'm starting to see in that area is real and genuine.

FF: WHAT DO YOU THINK IS SOMETHING THAT SETS STUCK OUT APART FROM OTHER **AUSTRALIAN POP PUNK BANDS?**

We really pride ourselves on the intensity and energy we put into not only our songs but our live performance. We want the room to be moving from the start to finish of our set, we want push pits, we want stage diving, we want people to enjoy the physical nature of live music as much as we do.

FF: WHERE DO YOU SEE YOUR BAND A FEW YEARS FROM NOW? WHAT ARE YOUR GOALS AS A GROUP?

We'll have an album under our belt and hopefully be touring in some foreign part of the world. We really can't wait for borders to open up and international touring to resume because we want to get out there as quick as possible!





FF: WHAT CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR NEWEST SINGLE 'RIGHT THROUGH ME'? WHAT IS THE STORY BEHIND THIS TRACK?

Our new single is the first of many that are going to solidify a whole new sound for us, and honestly we couldn't be more excited about it. Right Through Me was among the first songs we wrote that led us in this direction, and it was immediately one of our favorites. It's also a song that went through few changes in the pre-production process, other than a few added synth sounds and new vocal harmonies, so what you're hearing is a good representation of its raw form. We felt that although this song is a step in the new direction, it was a great bridge between Better Off and the next record to help ease our current listeners into it, while also grabbing the attention of people who don't already know about us.

As for the meaning of the lyrics, the song is about how absolutely petty and pointless arguments can get between close friends/couples who have been together for a long time. Think of it as all the things in your head that you want to say in argument but never do.

FF: WITH ALL THE MADNESS THAT'S CURRENTLY GOING ON IN THE WORLD, HOW DO YOU FEEL IT HAS AFFECTED YOU GUYS AND YOUR CREATIVITY?

To be honest, it's been a little rough, but it's had its silver linings. We wouldn't say we've been able to draw a lot of inspiration from current events, and if anything we feel fairly drained because these are situations we care deeply about. At the same time though, we recognize and are grateful for the fact that these situations (whether it be COVID, police brutality, the Palestine/Israel conflict, income inequality, etc.) have not debilitated us like they have so many people in the world. One silver lining was the fact that we were set to spend 2020 writing and recording anyways, and there was a chance we weren't going to tour much anyways. Instead we got the opportunity to buckle down and spend a lot of time honing this record to be everything it can be.

FF: WHERE DO YOU GET YOUR INSPIRATION FROM WHEN WRITING SONGS? HOW DOES YOUR CREATIVE PROCESS WORK?

Typically, John (guitarist) will come to us with a demo/idea for a song that is intentionally bare-bones and simple, with guitar, bass and MIDI drums. Then, Brian (vocalist) will meet with John and they'll work on song arrangement while Brian adds synth and sometimes some guitar leads. Daniel (drummer) and Ryne (bassist) will then take what drum and bass parts John and Brian have come up with and either put their spin on them or completely rework them to be what they think is best. Finally, Brian writes vocals over everything and will sometimes add additional synth on top. It's a pretty straightforward process and we used it for almost every song on the new record!

FF: WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THE ALTERNATIVE SCENE TODAY? WHAT ARE THE BEST AND WORST THINGS ABOUT IT?

To be honest, we don't feel like we have our ear to the ground quite as well as a lot of other people here in the alternative scene do, but we definitely try to keep up. That said, although we take a lot of influence from what some bands are doing today, we try really hard to keep what we create genuine to us as opposed to rehashing what another band has already done a lot better than what we could ever do. Our favorite aspect of the alternative scene is probably the amount of creativity a lot of artists have been exhibiting in getting their sound out there and keeping music listening fresh. Our least favorite is probably how clique-y and nepotistic the industry is as a whole, and that sometimes it doesn't matter how good your music is; it's about who you know

FF: WHAT HAS BEEN THE COOLEST EXPERIENCE SO FAR AS A BAND? WHAT KEEPS THE HOME TEAM GOING?

Honestly, our fans. Ever since we started our Patreon, we've had so much more communication with the people who love what we do, and it's been fantastic getting to know these amazing people on a personal level and being able to call them our friends. We definitely encourage everyone who loves our music to reach out to us, whether it be on a social media comment, a DM, or our Patreon's exclusive Discord. We make a point to show our fans that they are very, very appreciated.

FF: WHAT ELSE CAN WE EXPECT FROM THE HOME TEAM IN THE NEAR FUTURE?

We have a whole new full length album dropping this fall! We'll be rolling out new singles until then, so keep your eyes peeled for it! Once it's safe to do so, we will be hitting the touring circuit as hard as we possibly can, so make sure to find us in your area when we do!



FIRST AND FOREVER



FF: WE'VE HEARD THAT FIRST AND FOREVER STARTED ON CRAIGSLIST, CAN YOU TELL US MORE ABOUT THE BAND'S FORMATION? WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO START A CAREER IN MUSIC?

Since the first time I saw the music video for "I'm Not Okay" by My Chemical Romance I've wanted to be in a band. Unfortunately, I never had the self-confidence to actually go out and do it. Then one day in my mid 20's I woke up and thought "If I don't start this band today...I'll never do it". So that night I bought a six pack of Bud Light and went on Craigslist to find my band...the rest is history. My inspirations have always been linked to the mid 2000's emo scene. I was so inspired by it growing up and I wouldn't to give back to the community that made me who I am today.

FF: WHICH ARTISTS/MUSICIANS INFLUENCED FIRST AND FOREVER'S MUSIC?

All of the emo bands of the 2000's: My Chemical Romance, Taking Back Sunday, The Used, Paramore, Hawthorne Heights; this list could go on forever. If I had to pick one artist that creatively inspired First and Forever the most, it would probably be The Used.

FF: TELL US MORE ABOUT THE CREATIVE PROCESS BEHIND THE MAKING OF LETTHIS LOVE LIE DEAD'. WHAT'S THE OVERALL THEWE OF THE EP?

The creative process for 'Let This Love Lie Dead' was very unique. Each member of the band lived in a dfferent part of the world at the time. I (Marcus - Guitar) was traveling through Europe, so when we decided to do another record, I got a small guitar and started writing on the road. Consequently, each song has its own story. For example, In Loving Memory was written on a train in Transylvania the night before Halloween (it doesn't really get more emo than that).

The record touches on several different subjects, but the overall theme is coming to grips with dark realities and dealing with internal conflict. If I had to distill the message I want to send with this record into a single statement, it would be: Whatever it is that you're going through, you're not alone (in the dark with a hand grenade).

FE: FROM WHERE DO YOU USUALLY DERIVE INSPIRATION WHEN WRITING YOUR LYRICS?

Inspiration for lyrics comes from all sorts of different places, primarily from life experiences. Our lyrics are very visual; we like to paint pictures that evoke certain emotions (we are an emo band, after all). We use lyrics as a device to communicate how we have felt at certain times. My chest, your knife, I know what's on your mind, cut me open look inside. None of us have actually ever been carved open before, but we've definitely been in situations that felt like it.

FF: WHAT DO YOU THINK OF THE ALTERNATIVE SCENE IN THIS DAY AND AGE? WHAT ARE THE BEST AND WORST THINGS ABOUT IT?

It is the BEST time to be an alternative band right now (thank you MGK for bringing pop punk back haha). But seriously, it feels like an emo / pop punk renaissance and we couldn't be more excited about it. There are a lot of cool up and coming bands that will be breaking out along with the return of some of our favorites like My Chemical Romance. The worst thing about the scene is that it went away for wayyyyyy too long so thank god it's finally coming back!

FF: WHAT CAN YOUR LISTENERS EXPECT FROM FIRST AND FOREYER IN THE NEAR FUTURE?

More emo bangers... Like a lot more.

FF: YOU'VE BEEN TOGETHER SINCE 2017. HOW HAVE YOU DEALT WITH CONFLICTS AND/OR CREATIVE DIFFERENCES? WHAT KEEPS BIG SMILE GOING?

We've been lucky enough not to have any real major conflicts, and when we do disagree on anything that has to do with how we do business we keep it civil and talk things out until we decide on the best course of action. We also share a lot of the same influences musically and share the same vision for what kind of sound we want to go for. It also helps that we're all really good friends outside of music as well.

FF: WHAT IS THE STORY BEHIND YOUR NEW SINGLE AND MUSIC VIDEO 'FUCK OFF (BUTTAKE ME WITH YOU)'?

Fuck Off is a song about clinging to the way things once were even though friends have moved on in their life. It's kind of a return to the light hearted upbeat Big Smile sound after dealing with some heavier material in our past few releases. The music video depicts little moments we spend with our friends that we don't think are that big in the moment but we look back on and really miss how we felt in that moment.

FF: ALMOST A YEAR AGO, YOU ANNOUNCED YOUR SIGNING WITH ANCHOR EIGHTY FOUR RECORDS. HOW HAS WORKING WITH A RECORD LABEL CHANGED THE WAY THINGS GO FOR THE BAND? HOW IS IT DIFFERENT FROM BEING A DIY BAND?

Working with Anchor Eighty Four has been incredible for us. Cody, the label owner, shares the DIY mindset that we've applied to this band and his experience has helped us learn a lot about growing our band.

FF: HOW HAS YOUR SOUND EVOLVED SINCE THE RELEASE OF YOUR FIRST EP BACK IN 2018? HOW DO YOU WRITE MUSIC NOW?

We kind of take the same approach to songwriting that we always have, we're just much better at structuring songs now. We've been working with Seth Henderson on our last several releases and have learned a lot from him and have taken that into our songwriting process. The process usually starts with a riff that we work together and build into a full instrumental song, then Scooter catches a vibe from it and writes the melody from that.

FF: WHAT HAS BEEN YOUR BIGGEST CAREER HIGHLIGHT SO FAR?



Our biggest highlights so far has been opening a show for State Champs back in 2019 and signing with Anchor Eighty Four last year. With where we were as a band at that point in 2019 that show single handedly grew our audience by a lot and really legitimized everything we had been working for in our minds. Then the signing last year was a big moment for us and has taken our band to new heights, especially with the release of Fuck Off recently.

FF: WITH THE THREE SINGLES THAT WERE RELEASED EARLIER THIS YEAR, WHAT ELSE CAN WE EXPECT FROM BIG SMILE IN THE NEAR FUTURE?

Big Smile is looking forward to getting back on the road as soon as possible. We have a plan in place for getting back to live shows and we are working on new music at the moment as well. The rest of 2021 is looking very exciting for us.





FF: WHAT INSPIRED HOT MILK TO GET TOGETHER AND MAKE MUSIC TOGETHER? WHAT ARE YOUR MAIN GOALS AS A BAND?

Me and Jim were going through a really low point in life. We hated our jobs and we had a death close to us so we turned to music to help us feel better. Hot Milk was born from wanting to survive. For us this

is our child and our everything. For us we want to be able to be us, man. Something we weren't able to do before. We always had to answer to someone, we just wanted to get fuckin free of all that shite. If we can build a family along the way that is accepting, loving and inspires people to be themselves without worrying what others think then we have found our meaning. Life is nasty brutish and short, we intend to live every fuckin ounce of it and be aggresively bold.

FF: SINCE YOUR 2019 DEBUT, HOT MILK HAS BEEN RAPIDLY MAKING WAVES AND GAINING NOTABILITY. DID YOU EXPECT THE RECEPTION YOU'VE GOT SO FAR? WHAT DOES IT TAKE TO BREAK THROUGH IN THE SCENE TODAY?

Nah never, we just did this band because we had to write. everything we do comes from our hearts and is written in our bedrooms. I think people can see we're real, every bit of love and pain comes from a real feeling which is why Hot Milk is therapy. For as long as we need a way of coping with our emotions and feelings, hot milk will survive. Just gotta be who you are man, and have your wits about you coz they're are fuckin snakes everywhere who haven't realised that greed can't be taken past the grave. We know this is all finite coz everything is, rock n roll is our passion and love to live this life through. It is in our bloody bones.

FF: YOU'VE BEEN KNOWN TO WRITE MUSIC THAT DERIVES IMPORTANT MESSAGES AND OPINIONS. CAN YOU LET US IN ON THE CONCEPT BEHIND THE TRACK AND MUSIC VIDEO OF YOUR LATEST ONE 'GLASS SPIDERS'?

That song was about never being good enough and just wanting to fuck it all off, rage quitting. Like, shall I just give you everything or is that still not good enough? That coupled song conveys for us, we know all about that feeling.

FF: HOW DOES YOUR CREATIVE PROCESS GO? HOW DO YOU WRITE YOUR SONGS?

Different every time!!! Han just wrote a song in her childhood bedroom on an acoustic guitar, we;ve also written with 808 drum machines coming up with some cool beat and built from there. Honestly, inspiration is everywhere if you let it find you and we think keeping it fresh is the best way to challenge yourself. Everything is pretty much written at home in Manchester and produced in Jims bedroom so we are homegrown. It's important to us that we keep that element no matter where this band takes us.

FF: WHAT'S THE BEST ADVICE YOU GUYS HAVE RECEIVED SO FAR?

Best advice we ever had was to not tell anyone what you're doing, just do it. SURPRISE HAS POWER.

FF: WE HEARD THAT YOU'RE CURRENTLY WORKING ON A NEW EP AND YOU'RE PRODUCING IT AS WELL. CAN YOU TELL US SOME INSIGHTS ABOUT IT? WHAT CAN YOUR LISTENERS EXPECT FROM THIS NEW RECORD?

Aww man, the new record is like songs we actually love to play. our first EP will always have a place in our souls but this next one is more us, it's more grown up and it has so many different elements in it. Queen and the Prodigy are two big influences for us and I think you can hear them on this record, honestly we love to keep people guessing so every song is very different. But it's all fuckin real life shit, even the bad shit that we sing about. I think that people might be a bit taken aback by one or two songs but Hot Milk is us and this is what came out this time, just gotta fuckin roll with it and live it for yourself.





FF: WHEN AND HOW DID WEATHER-STATE START AND DECIDED TO MAKE MUSIC AS A GROUP?

We actually formed out of the ashes of an old band back in 2013. At the time a few of us were living in Bristol just finishing up University. We then brought Toby in who was playing in another band of mine at the time. Myself, Harry and Hogan have been making music together since we were 16 back in our original hometown of Weymouth. In a weird way it's hard to picture making music without them at this point.

FF: HOW DO YOU GUYS FORM YOUR SOUND? HOW DOES THE SONGWRITING PROCESS WORK WITHIN THE GROUP?

Usually the core of the song can stem from a chord pattern or a melody Harry will work on. Or alternatively, I may get carried away working on a demo at home. Typically we're used to working together on songs in the practice room, but over the past year we've got used to writing in our spaces. It's been challenging but it works surprisingly well.

FF: WITH THE RISE OF MANY NEW UK BANDS IN THE POP PUNK SCENE, WHAT DO YOU THINK MAKES WEATHERSTATE DIFFERENT/STAND OUT FROM THE REST?

It's a tricky one. Whilst we have grown up on the genre, We've always felt sandwiched between two worlds as Weatherstate. I mean, we grew up on pop punk bands like Green Day, Rancid, The Offspring. But we have also grew up on Hardcore, Grune, Metalcore, Alternative Rock and Pop music all seperately. That's what I enjoy about Weatherstate. There's this push and pull between all these influences and i feel that's more apparent than ever on our latest material.

FF: TELL US ABOUT YOUR NEWEST SINGLE 'HANGAR'. WHAT IS IT ABOUT AND WHAT IS THE INSPIRATION BEHIND IT?

It's strange. It just kinda happened last year. We were locked away like the rest of the world. I was just jamming a riff and some chugging power chords and that's kind of where Hangar started. Once Harry got more involved it kind of evolved from there. At the time, Harry drew influence from a phone call he had with a friend talking about how f*cked everything is and the retaliation of growing bitter and numb towards everything and everyone.

FF: WHAT CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOURSELVES? HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE GLIMMERS' MUSIC?

We're a pop/rock band from Atlanta, Ga and literally the best of friends. Our music can be best described as nostalgic pop/rock, and we're heavily influenced by artists/bands such as All Time Low, Mayday Parade, and Julia Michaels. We just want to make people happy with our music, and we hope people can connect to the stories that we tell.

FF: YOU RECENTLY RELEASED A FIVE-TRACK EP CALLED 'WORLD'S APART' + FIVE MUSIC VIDEOS AS WELL. HOW DID THE CONCEPTUALIZATION FOR IT COME ABOUT?

In spring of 2020, all of these songs were fully recorded! I (Maggie) started watching different music videos like Fall Out Boy's The Youngblood Chronicles, and had the idea to tell a narrative through each of the songs. "Worlds Apart" tells the story of a complex relationship that is full of ups and downs. Our amazing videographer Deanna Elise wrote the story with me, and we made sure that each music video acted as a new episode to this larger story. I'm a huge musical theatre nerd, so this project made those dreams come true.

FF: WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART OF A SONG THAT YOU'VE WRITTEN IN THIS EP? IT CAN BE A LYRIC, GUITAR RIFF, ETC.

My favorite lyric from the EP is in "Not Good at Goodbyes." It says "I'd rather get burned than deny what's real." This is my favorite lyric I've written thus far because it's deeply honest. I would rather go after what I want - whether it be a relationship or a dream - than regret not trying. "Not Good at Goodbyes" is me in a song.

FF: WHAT HAS BEEN YOUR BIGGEST STRUGGLE AS A BAND AND HOW DID YOU WORK IT OUT?

I think my biggest struggle was transitioning from being a solo artist into being the frontwoman of glimmers. Originally, my wonderful bandmates were my backing band, and we made the decision to move forward as a collective in early 2020. It was difficult for me at first to accept help, and trust in the fact that I was not alone anymore - onstage or offstage. FF: WHAT CAN YOU TELL US ABOUT YOUR UPCOMING LIVE STREAM PERFORMANCE? WHAT CAN WE EXPECT FROM IT AND FROM YOUR BAND IN GENERAL IN THE NEAR FUTURE?

I am so excited about our upcoming livestream. All of the ticket proceeds go to our hometown venue, The Masquerade. We truly love the family there, and they've supported me since I was 15. You can expect a full-production show with a ton of energy! It's what you'll see in real life when we begin to play shows again.

FF: YOU'VE DROPPED 'SMILE' AND 'WORTH IT' DURING THIS PANDEMIC. HOW HAVE YOU FOUND BEING CREATIVE DURING THIS TIME?

-We actually finished writing "Smile" way before the pandemic, and later on added minor changes to the structure of the song last year (2020). We then proceeded to write "Worth It" as a song for the listeners, actually, not just the listeners, but also for

Everyone's having a pretty rough year, including us, and writing music has been very helpful as a distraction, therapeutic if I may say so myself, and seeing people appreciate the music we create, it has been enough to keep our focus and creativity during this pandemic.

FF: THE RELEASE OF 'ROSES' IS JUST AROUND THE CORNER, WHAT IS THE MAIN DRIVE OF THIS SONG?

-I think the song "Worth It" gave us the drive we needed for the next two songs we are about to release, not just Roses specifically, and I think that speaks a lot for ourselves.

FF: LASTLY, WHAT'S IN STORE FOR SEASICK IN THE NEAR FUTURE?


The band is currently finishing the remaining tracks of the forthcoming album, which, hopefully, will be released this year. We are also planning to have an online show for our album launch.

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

We've recently had the pleasure to catch up with their bassist Nick Ventimiglia, who offered insights inside the soulful and charismatic energy of Grayscale.








FF: WHAT ARE THE KEY DIFFERENCES/CHANGES YOU'VE NOTICED IN THE ALTERNATIVE SCENE TODAY COMPARED TO WHEN YOU FIRST STARTED IN 2011?

NICK V: I FEEL LIKE THE CONSUMPTION OF MUSIC IS THE BIGGEST DIFFERENCE. EVEN BEFORE 2011 YOU COULD SEE THAT PEOPLE'S MUSICAL ATTENTION SPAN WAS SHRINKING. DIGITAL STREAMING PLATFORMS CATER TO SINGLES MORE SO THAN ALBUMS BECAUSE EVERYTHING IS SO TANGIBLE NOW. WE RECEIVE THINGS SO QUICKLY THAT AN ALBUM ALMOST HAS LOST ITS EXCITEMENT. IT'S ALMOST A HIP HOP LEANING STYLE OF RELEASING THAT PEOPLE ARE ADAPTING TO BECAUSE EVERYONE NEEDS TO CONSTANTLY BE STIMULATED OR THEY FORGET ABOUT YOU.

THERE ARE SO MANY ARTISTS THAT WANT TO BE CREATIVE AND HAVE OVERARCHING THEMES, OR WANT FANS TO UNDERSTAND WHAT'S BEHIND THE MUSIC LYRICALLY AND SOMETIMES THOSE THINGS ARE OVERLOOKED NOW. IT'S THIS "GIMME GIMME" MENTALITY OF LISTENING TO EVERYTHING YOU CAN AND THEN IT'S ON TO THE NEXT ONE. EVERY ARTIST ADAPTS IN THEIR OWN WAY BUT PART OF ME WISHES MUSIC WAS STILL LISTENED TO AS WHOLE ALBUMS, AND SOME PEOPLE STILL DEFINITELY DO, I JUST SEE IT HAS BEEN PHASING OUT FOR SOME TIME. FF: What could you say has been the most challenging thing you had to face and overcome as a group? How did you push through?



FF: Lets talk about your latest album 'All Distortions Are Intentional'. How did the songwriting process work with writing it?

We Might Be Airight Waxflower

If bands such as Lamb of God can start a Wall of Death with their music, then Waxflower is more than capable of starting a Wall of Love with their latest EP, We Might Be Alright. Now, it is difficult to imagine electronic beats blending well with typical elements of pop punk. Waxflower somehow not only manages to make that unusual combination work. They also manage to make it sound incredibly catchy. Additionally, what is not difficult to imagine is the sight of hundreds of people holding hands and swaying their heads from side to side as the band plays the songs featured on this EP. Maybe longtime fans and new fans can do just those once physical distancing is no longer required to be done in public.

In terms of production, all the instruments can be clearly heard in the mix, including the bass. The sounds of the snare drum and the cymbals are delightful. Kudos to the producer and the engineer for their amazing efforts. In terms of songwriting, all instruments get to shine as well. For example, both the drummer and the bassist demonstrate their abilities to stand out on the fourth song, Fake Frown.

Although some of the lyrics sound repetitive, the vocal melodies are the most enjoyable aspects of the songs. Then again, the first song can sound a lot more memorable if the harmonies sung by the two vocalists are different notes, instead of the same notes at different octaves. Despite the minor flaws, this EP is highly recommended to both casual listeners and hardcore lans of pop-punk. If this EP can be summarized in three words, then those words would be, 'Soundtrack To Wholesomeness.'
